Slide 2: Proposed Updates to Board Resolutions Overview of Resolutions

- Certificates of mailing for Notices of Action (NOAs)
- Out-of-state travel approval
- Contracts for procurement activity in excess of \$1 million
- Tax litigation settlement authority

Slide 3: Certificates of Mailing on NOAs

A graphic showing the United States Postal Service Certificate of Mailing appears.

- Current Resolution 11-1-88
 - o Requires certificates of mailing for all NOAs reporting a deficiency
- Proposed Change
 - Would require certificates of mailing for NOAs reporting a deficiency for \$100,000 or more

Slide 4: Out-of-State Travel Approval

- Current Resolution 98-19
 - Requires Board approval for out-of-state travel in excess of \$50,000 per year
 - o Excludes travel for audit and specific case representation
- Proposed Changes
 - Would require Board approval for out-of-state travel in excess of \$100,000 per year
 - o Would also exclude other mission-critical travel from the threshold
 - Information security, information technology support, and administrative compliance

Slide 5: Contracts for Procurement Activity

- Current Resolution 98-7
 - Requires Board approval of contracts exceeding \$1 million dollars
- Proposed Changes
 - Would require Board approval of contracts exceeding \$2 million dollars

 Would require written notice to the Board of contracts exceeding \$1 million, but less than \$2 million

Slide 6: Tax Litigation Settlement Authority

- Current Resolution 98-8
 - o Requires Board approval of settlements of \$250,000 or more
 - The threshold is dependent on the tax and interest amount that the taxpayer seeks
- Proposed Changes
 - Would require Board approval of tax litigation settlements for \$500,000 or more
 - Would require written notice to the Board of tax litigation settlements for \$250,000 or more, and less than \$500,000
 - o Would be dependent on the total settlement amount
