Following the first interested parties meeting (IPM) held on December 3, 2010, at the second IPM staff will introduce and solicit public input on proposed amendments to California Code of Regulations (CCR), title 18, sections 19322 (Claim for Refund Regulation). As discussed at the first IPM¹, the proposed amendments to the regulation are intended to:

- Specify the information that must be contained within claim for refund.
- Clarify the permitted manner of filing claims for refund.
- Prepare for the future of electronically-filed claims for refund.
- Clarify oral hearing procedures for claims for refund.
